

The following bond schedule is intended for persons arrested and detained on charges for violating the Thornton Municipal Code and who are not served a summons or granted a personal recognizance bond. At the discretion of the Chief of Police or his designee, a summons may be served, or a personal recognizance bond granted in lieu of bail. A Personal Recognizance bond should not exceed \$500.


PLEASE NOTE: Nothing in this bond schedule is intended to remove officer discretion. A bond is not a punitive measure and should only be used when necessary to ensure the appearance of the person in court or the safety of any person or persons or the community.

Dangerous Weapon (b)(1); (b)(2); (b)(5) – to include blackjack, gas gun, brass knuckles, machine gun, short shotgun, short rifle, air gun, bludgeon, chemical agent, slingshot	\$500
Discharging Weapon	\$750
Disorderly Conduct (a)(1); (a)(3)	\$500
Harassment (b)(1); (b)(2); (b)(4); (c)(3); (d)	\$750
Neglect of Animals	\$750
Motor Vehicle Theft	\$750
Obstructing/Resisting	\$1000
Prohibited Weapons – to include blackjack, booby trap, brass knuckles, concealed bladed weapon, gas gun, gravity knife, switchblade	\$500
Shoplifting/Theft/Price Switching/False Refund (value greater than \$300)	\$500
Trespass- Motor Vehicle (b)(4)	\$750
Violation of a Protective Order	\$1,000

For all other offenses in which a summons is not issued, a Personal Recognizance bond is not granted, and the offense qualifies for a monetary bond upon arrest or warrant application:

- Offenses Against the Person: \$1,000 cash or surety
- Offenses Involving Weapons: \$750 cash or surety
- Offenses Involving Animals: \$750 cash or surety
- Offenses Against Property (over \$300): \$500 cash or surety
