Utility rates provide system stability and funding to meet new drinking water standards



Thornton continues to see increases in the costs to operate its utility operations for water, sewer, trash, and recycling. The chemicals Thornton uses to provide clean safe drinking water have increased in price by 55% in the last two years alone. Because of these rising prices, a rate increase has been approved for Thornton water customers with the average increase being \$2.32 per month. This new rate will provide for the long-term stability of the water system and provide the capacity to meet new drinking water standards being enacted by the Environment Protection Agency. The new rates begin April 1, 2024.

Metro Water Recovery provides all sewage treatment for the city of Thornton. About 75% of the cost of sewer services for Thornton residents and businesses is a pass-through cost directly to Metro Water Recovery. The remaining 25% is used by the utility to maintain the systems within the city of Thornton. A rate increase averaging 91 cents per month for most customers has been approved effective April 1, 2024. The approved Thornton Sewer Rates still keep Thornton near the very bottom of all Front Range municipal sewer rates.

Thornton's rates for solid waste collection have not

increased in over 10 years. Costs have increased 29% for trash, 36% for recycling, and 23% for maintenance over last year. Most single-family homes in Thornton choose to use city trash/recycling services as apposed to a private hauler, however, many residents do not have a choice due to their HOA assigning a trash hauler to their community. For Thornton customers, even with the approved increase of \$4/month, they still pay less for solid waste collection than nearly all people in the Front Range.

- Current rates are \$13.50/month for Thornton service which include curbside recycling and events.
- Rates in other areas are as high as \$44 and can include various services, surcharges and fees.
- Northglenn, Arvada, Denver (\$16-\$21)
- Golden, Longmont, Louisville (\$30-\$44)
- Private Hauler low example \$18.50 for Trash only

Each of these Thornton utilities is an independent, not-for-profit, business with Thornton City Council functioning as the Board of Directors.

Have Code Violations in Your Yard?

LET CODECAP HELP

Through CodeCAP, the Code Compliance Assistance Program, income-qualified Thornton homeowners can receive free assistance fixing yard code violations. Eligible projects include hazardous tree removal; trash and debris removal including furniture, appliances, and vehicles; fence repair/replacement and minor front yard water-wise landscaping. Free Tax Preparation for **QUALIFIED INDIVIDUALS**

Thornton residents with an income limit of \$60,000/year can get free tax assistance. This service is provided by IRS-certified volunteers on a first-come, first-served basis and is available on Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Thursdays, now through April 10, 9 a.m.-2 p.m., Thornton Community Connections, 9471 Dorothy Blvd. No appointment is needed. Assistance available for your THORNTON WATER BILL

The Thornton Water Assistance Program helps lower-income individuals and families to pay their water bills. Residential Thornton Water customers, homeowners, and renters can apply for the program once per calendar year. Those who meet the program qualifications will receive credit on their water account. The 2024 credit for those with a Thornton Water account is \$360 and for those living in a master meter community is \$80. Planning landscaping or construction? Be sure you don't change your lot's drainage pattern

Thornton frequently receives complaints from residents about changes on an adjacent property that now affect the drainage around their home. Some of the issues include constructing a new fence that now blocks flow across or along the property line; constructing a block or timber landscaping wall that does the same; changing the discharge point of a sump pump or downspouts; or "leveling" the ground to place a new sidewalk, driveway, or shed near the property line. City Code, Section 18-657, prohibits changing the pattern of stormwater flows after construction per an approved drainage plan. Generally, two drainage patterns are designed for individual lots:

• A "Type A" lot is set up to drain from the back lot line to the street. This type of lot depends on an uninterrupted path along the side lot line between two properties, from the back corners to the front sidewalk and top of curb. The side lot drainage is typically graded out to be shared equally between the two lots. Constructing a patio, driveway, side of the house sidewalk, solid fence, or retaining wall up against the property line potentially pushes all the drainage onto another property.

 A "Type B" lot has a high point on the lot. Drainage from the back side of the structure drains to the back lot line, and from the front side of the structure drains to the street. At the back of the lot, the drainage is either intended to 1) flow into the lot to the rear, or 2) the common back lot lines form a swale that then drains lot to lot along the back lot lines until it reaches a street, inlet, or stream channel. Under the first scenario the lower lot cannot construct obstructions for flow coming across the back lot line. Under the second scenario, the downhill lots cannot construct obstructions to flow passing from the high end of their backlot to the lower end. There is still drainage required along the side lot lines of a Type B lot to provide free drainage between adjacent structures.

So, if you are considering making alterations to your property, including new landscaping or trees, first carefully observe the drainage patterns along the sides, back, and even the front of your lot, and ensure that you do not inadvertently change the drainage patterns.

Broadband services coming to Thornton

Thornton residents and businesses will have a new option for high-speed broadband services in Thornton in the not-so-distant future. In January, Thornton entered into an agreement with Ting to build a fiber-to-the-home broadband service throughout the city. Ting provides a 2-gigabit speed to every customer using a fiber optic network, and offers internet to residents who qualify for the Affordable Connectivity Program (ACP) at no cost to them. Ting representatives presented before the City Council on February 13, 2024, letting them know it is the company's plan to start the installation of the new fiber optic network in the near future. Ting serves

other communities in Colorado and has been praised for their customer service and communication with people during construction of the fiber infrastructure.

"For years, people in Thornton have told us they want options and competition for high-speed broadband services in our city. We could not be happier that we reached agreement with Ting to come in and provide their 2-gigabit service to the residents and businesses in Thornton," says Mayor Jan Kulmann. Ting brings a reputable track record for providing quality service and we believe our partnership with them will enhance the quality of life for residents in Thornton."

Volunteer for the upcoming neighborhood clean-up event

A Neighborhood Clean-up event is scheduled in May, and your help is needed. As a volunteer you will help during neighborhood clean-ups and assist eligible residents unable to maintain their yard to avoid City Code violations. Services provided include mowing, weed whacking, light tree and brush trimming, raking, and general clean-up. Volunteers ages 13-17 are welcome with parent permission. National Community Development Week: April 1-5

The Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Program is among the few flexible sources of federal funds that remain available to rural governments for community development. For 50 years these grants have been used to benefit aspects of communities across the U.S. "Annually Thornton receives this grant that can be used for housing, public facilities, public services, and economic development activities that benefit our low to moderate-income residents and neighborhoods," says Thornton Deputy Director of Parks, Recreation, & Community Services. Jaylin Stotler. "Using the grant funds, Thornton has administered home repair programs; solar panel installations; emergency rent, mortgage, and utility assistance; homeless assistance programs; ADA sidewalk improvements; park improvements; and more," says Stotler. The CDBG program and the benefits it brings to communities are spotlighted each year in April during National Community Development Week. Thornton is currently accepting 2024 grant funding applications from agencies with eligible projects.
