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Thornton City Council welcomes new City Manager, ushering in a new era of leadership

Tansy Hayward is the new City Manager for the city of Thornton. She started working for Thornton on October 21, 2024, and was sworn in on October 22 at the City Council Meeting. Thornton's Mayor and City Council unanimously selected Hayward after an extensive and competitive selection process, during which Hayward emerged as the top candidate. Hayward's contract was formally presented for approval at the August 27, 2024, Thornton City Council meeting. Many on the Council stated that the decision to appoint Hayward reflects a shared commitment to maintaining Thornton's status as a forward-thinking, community-focused city.

"Thornton is a beautiful place with an amazing quality of life," said Hayward. "The collective efforts of the community, and current and prior elected officials and staff have not only built this exceptional community, but have also positioned it for the future. I'm thrilled to make Thornton my new home and honored that I will have the opportunity to work in partnership to shape that future."

Hayward's last position was with Raleigh, North Carolina where she worked since 2014, and served as Deputy City

Manager since 2021. Previously she worked for Tacoma, Washington for eight years, with the last six years as the Assistant City Manager. Hayward has broad experience supervising Departments across her career and has led and assisted departments with major projects and decisions, including many that prepare for growth. Hayward is a native Kansan and holds her undergraduate and MPA degrees from the University of Kansas.



She has 21-year-old twin daughters and two golden retrievers.

Thornton opens newly constructed Community Center and Anythink Library



Thornton opened the doors to the newly constructed Thornton Community Center, 2211 Eppinger Blvd., on Saturday, October 26. The highly anticipated event brought together community members, dignitaries, and invited guests to celebrate the unveiling of this state-of-the-art facility. "We are excited to open the doors of the new Thornton Community Center and Anythink Library to our residents," said Thornton Recreation Administrator Jenny Dowdell. "This facility represents our commitment to providing a vibrant, inclusive space that promotes health, education, and community connection."

The new facility offers:

- Anythink Library: A full library collection, public computers, dedicated spaces for children and teens, study rooms, and The Studio Maker Space.
- Recreation Facilities: Walking track, weight room, cardio and circuit area, TRX equipment, and a gymnasium for basketball, volleyball, and pickleball.

- Community Spaces: Coffee corner, classrooms for new programming and rentals, meeting rooms, multipurpose rooms, an outdoor amphitheater, and a meditation garden.
- Recreation Programming:, preschool, dance, Tae kwon do, boxing, and more to continue continuity and growth in community engagement and well-being.

The original Thornton Community Center, built in 1974, was the first recreation facility in the city, and was closed for demolition on August 5, 2022. "Thornton is dedicated to enhancing the quality of life for its residents by providing exceptional services, facilities, and opportunities for all," says Dowdell. "With a strong commitment to community engagement and innovation, Thornton continues to be a vibrant place to live, work, and play."

Thornton PD Co-Responder Teams are making a real difference in our community

A recent study by the American Psychological Association found that almost 20% of calls to law enforcement are about mental health crises. In Thornton, these calls used to be answered by patrol officers. But as of October 2023, the Thornton Police Department has a new approach: the Co-Responder Teams.

These teams, made up of a police officer and a licensed mental health clinician, handle most of these challenging calls now. They deal with everything from substance abuse to mental health issues, medical concerns, and various other stressful situations. They respond and connect with Thornton residents in crisis, combining their skills to ensure everyone's safety, identify the core issues, and find a positive way forward. They also follow up with people they've previously helped and take on referrals from other officers or departments. Here are a few examples of the amazing work the Co-Responder Teams are doing:

Helping a Resident Rebuild her Life

Patrol officers called the Co-Responder Team to help a woman who had lost both her parents and her home within a short period. Her neighbor had taken her in, and that's where the team met her. She shared that her home had been condemned after her parents died and that she had never had a driver's license, insurance, a job, or lived on her own. She was dealing with high anxiety, grief, and a lack of independence.

The team stepped in to provide support. They connected her with mental health resources and helped her get a therapist to work through her grief and develop coping skills. With their help, she applied for jobs and eventually found an apartment. Each time they met, she expressed her gratitude and shared how she was taking control of her future, despite her challenging past.

Averting a Tragic Outcome

One night, a man called 911 saying he planned to end his life but wanted first responders to find him before his



wife did. Co-Responder Clinician Nora Sullivan began texting the man while Officer Antillon drove to his address. Nora managed to get him on the phone and calm him down enough to accept help. Once they arrived, officers ensured everyone's safety, and Nora, along with Clinician Ellen Pronio, talked to the man inside his home. He talked extensively with Sullivan and Officer Antillon and agreed to assistance.

Offering Lifesaving Support to Overdose Survivors

Part of the program's funding comes from a grant tied to opioid settlement funds. This enables the team to follow up with overdose survivors and provide them with lifesaving medication like naloxone. During these follow-up visits, the team speaks with both the survivors and their relatives, educating them about the dangers of drug addiction and offering support resources. They also teach friends and family members how to use naloxone, potentially saving lives in future emergencies.

The Heart of the Co-Responder Program

The mission of the Thornton Police Department Co-Responder Program is simple but powerful: "To promote wellness and safety in our community by providing effective and compassionate behavioral health response and intervention." The program is growing and evolving, bringing more help, new policing approaches, and essential services to Thornton residents.

Shopping carts belong in stores, not neighborhoods!

Abandoned shopping carts are not only unsightly, but also pose safety risks to pedestrians and motorists. Left unchecked, they can lead to more severe blight issues. That's why in May 2024, the Thornton City Council passed an ordinance to establish a comprehensive program for removing shopping carts from public areas. The program authorizes the city to charge retail owners for each cart

Thornton Code Compliance has launched a new shopping cart retrieval program to ensure abandoned carts don't go unnoticed. Thornton has partnered with Kept Companies for a citywide shopping cart retrieval effort.

Here's how it works:

- Weekly Sweeps: Kept Companies conducts weekly sweeps in areas most affected by abandoned carts.
- On-Demand Pickups: In less affected areas, cart

retrieval is done on a complaint basis. Coverage can be adjusted based on demand.

 Cart Disposal: Unidentifiable carts, or those not claimed by stores, will be disposed of by the city.

Fall Leaf Disposal Options Saturday, November 2, 8 a.m.-noon - Leaves may be dropped off in the compost bin at the Infrastructure Maintenance Center (IMC) 12450 Washington St. Be prepared to empty plastic bags on site. Proof of residency required. The compost bin may also be accessed for leaf disposal on weekdays from 7:30 a.m. - 3:30 p.m.

City trash customers may continue to place their bagged leaves at the curb on their regular trash pickup day through November 15. Fill the black trash containers first. Bags filled with trash or other debris will not be collected. Restrictions apply.

Thanksgiving Holiday Delay - City collection service will be on a oneday delay November 28 and 29. If your normal trash/recycle pickup day is Thursday, November 28, it will be collected on Friday, November 29. If your normal trash/recycle pickup day is Friday, November 29, it will be collected on Saturday, November 30.

No Cooking Oil - Thornton is no longer allowed to accept used cooking oil for drop-off. Please contact Veolia at 303-526-8155 for more information on how to properly dispose of cooking oil and other household hazardous waste.

Christmas and New Year Holiday Delays - Trash/Recycling collection service will be on a one delay starting Wednesday, December 25. Collection service will also be on a one-day delay starting Wednesday, January 1, 2025.

Special Christmas Wrap Collection - December 26-31 - Place flattened holiday boxes and bagged wrapping paper at the curb for collection on your trash day. Please use the black trash containers first.

Christmas Tree Curbside Pick Up - City trash/recycle customers may place their natural Christmas trees at the curb for collection on their regular trash collection day from December 30 - January 10. Please do not wrap the trees in plastic and remove all ornaments and lights.

Christmas Tree Recycle Drop Off - Saturday, January 11, 8 a.m.-noon, Thornton residents may bring their natural Christmas trees to the IMC, 12450 Washington St., for recycling. Proof of residency is required. Restrictions and limitations apply.

CodeCAP celebrates a successful first year of assisting Thornton homeowners

Since its launch on August 23, 2023, Thornton's Code Compliance Assistance Program (CodeCAP), has been making a significant impact on the community. Funded by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD), CodeCAP helps income-eligible homeowners in Thornton address and resolve code violations in their yards. The program covers a range of projects, including the removal of hazardous trees, trash and debris clean-up, fence repairs or replacements, and minor restorative front yard landscaping.

In its first year, CodeCAP has already made a difference in the lives of many residents. The program assisted 23 homes and is currently processing 19 active applications. Beyond individual assistance, CodeCAP introduced Neighborhood Clean-Up Events, which aim to support the community and tackle widespread yard code violations. These events have served 13 homes and involved 182 hours of volunteer work. Additionally, CodeCAP provided one-on-one support to residents referred by Thornton's Code Compliance team, bringing another seven homes into code compliance with the help of four dedicated volunteers who contributed over 130 hours of their time.

CodeCAP's innovative approach to community assistance is not only unique to Colorado but has also earned recognition beyond Thornton. The Denver Regional Council of Governments honored CodeCAP with the 2024 Metro Vision Award, celebrating the program's commitment to improving neighborhood standards and fostering a spirit of community involvement. When it comes to water: it's time to get your home ready for winter

Stay warm and water-wise this winter, Thornton by winterizing your home's water systems, inside and out. Here are some tips:

Outdoors: Protect your perennial garden and trees by adding three inches of mulch to insulate plant roots but keep mulch a few inches away from tree bases to prevent decay. Wrap young tree trunks with commercial tree wrap up to the first branches to avoid frost damage. Remember, trees need water even in winter—water them at least once a month when temperatures are above 40 degrees to ensure they thrive.

Indoors: Your pipes can get much colder than your home, so insulate them with pipe insulation, heat tape, or heat cables, especially in unheated areas like crawl spaces or garages. When temperatures drop, keep water moving by dripping hot and cold water from faucets and opening cabinet doors under sinks to allow warm air to reach uninsulated pipes.

Keeping our roads safe: Thornton's snow removal policy

The City of Thornton's snow removal team is dedicated to keeping roads safe for residents. Our work starts even before a storm hits, with crews monitoring conditions and preparing for plowing. When a storm leaves more than nine inches of snow, we bring in extra help to clear residential streets after main roads are safe. Thornton maintains over 1,300 miles of roads, including:

- Primary Streets (e.g., 120th Avenue, Colorado Boulevard)
- Secondary Streets (e.g., Eppinger Boulevard, Cottonwood Lakes Boulevard)
- Residential Streets

Plows work continuously on Primary Streets to keep them open, then move to Secondary Streets as conditions allow. When plows reach your neighborhood, they clear snow from the center of the street. This approach avoids requiring residents to move parked cars.

When it comes to sidewalks, residents must clear snow from the sidewalk in front of their house within 24 hours after a storm. If you see a sidewalk not shoveled, contact Thornton Code Enforcement at **303-538-7517**.

How You Can Help

- Shovel Early: Early shoveling prevents snow from packing into ice
- Clear to Pavement: Shovel all the way to the pavement to stop ice from forming.

- Shovel Smart: Push snow instead of lifting it to reduce strain.
- Use Safe Deicers: Choose eco-friendly and pet-safe deicers to protect your lawn and storm sewers.
- Request Services: Submit snow removal requests through the MyThornton app.
