# Thornton residents, get ready for a significant step forward in securing our city's water future

A crucial 12-mile pipeline segment of the Thornton Water Project, (TWP), will bring this aspect of Thornton water service closer to reality. It will run within the Thornton city limits and will make up Segment A. This spring, Thornton entered into a contract for the segment construction. Phase I begins at the intersection of East 168th Avenue and Quebec Street, extending south along Quebec Street to East 120th Avenue. Phase II south to the Thornton Wes Brown Water Treatment Plant near East 88th Avenue and Colorado Boulevard.

#### **Pipeline History**

The TWP, a vital initiative to bring clean, safe, and reliable drinking water to our community, is an ambitious project involving constructing a pipeline that will transport water purchased by Thornton back in the 1980s through Larimer, Weld, and Adams counties, ensuring we meet our growing water demands well beyond 2060.

The TWP spans over 70 miles with a 42-inch diameter pipeline, divided into six segments. Each segment is independently designed and constructed. Notably, Segment D, a seven-mile stretch in Windsor and Johnstown, was successfully completed in 2022.

#### Getting Segment A Underway

Construction for the Segment A section kicked off in the third quarter of this year and is expected to wrap up by the second quarter of 2026. Initially, two pipeline crews will commence work on Phase I near Quebec Street and E-470, installing the pipeline in opposite directions toward the project's northern and southern boundaries.



Chief Gordon says he is most proud of the accomplishments that have little to do with police work and nothing to do with awards or promotions,


- Working and teaching for the past 25 years on issues of stress, resilience, and wellness.

#### **Ballot** initiative

This November, Thornton voters will be asked to decide how vacancies that occur for city council member positions are filled in the city. On July 9, 2024, the Thornton City Council approved a ballot question to ask Thornton voters if they want to change the Thornton Charter which currently requires the mayor and city council members vote to appoint someone to fill a vacancy on council. The appointed individual then serves as council member for the remainder of the term of the seat that was vacated. The ballot question approved by City Council is to change the Charter so that a special election is held to fill the vacancy if more than one year remains in the term of the council member seat that was vacated. Should there be more than a year left in the term of the vacant council position, a special election would be held within 120 days of

the vacancy occurring, but not within 90 days of a regular Adams County election. If a vacancy occurs with one year or less left in the term for a council member position, the mayor and council would vote to appoint someone. The term of office for the newlyelected council member would be for the remainder of the vacated term.

If a vacancy occurs during a period of time when Thornton can participate in a coordinated election with Adams County, the estimated cost for the special election of a council member is estimated to be between \$15,000 and \$20,000 per Ward. Thornton's City Clerk has estimated that the cost of a special election to fill a vacancy at a time when there is no normally scheduled Adams County November election would be between \$51,000-\$65,000 per Ward per vacancy.

New technology to improve taste of your water

If you've driven along 88th Avenue near Colorado Boulevard, you might have noticed something new in Thornton's East Gravel Lake. This summer,

Thornton deployed ultrasonication units to tackle the frequent growth of cyanobacteria, or blue-green algae, in our water reservoirs.

These algae can cause unpleasant odors and tastes in the water, especially when they bloom excessively. Cyanobacteria use gas vacuoles to float and sink, aiding their growth and photosynthesis. The new ultrasonication units disrupt this buoyancy, preventing the algae from growing and forming large blooms. This means fewer bad odors and tastes, leading to better water quality for residents.

The water quality team will monitor the effectiveness of these units and may consider using them in other reservoirs based on their performance.
